- By providing widespread access to essential information, CATs play a crucial role in empowering communities, enhancing their knowledge, and promoting social and community development.


OBJECTIVE


To explore the role of Community Audio Towers (CATs) in enhancing rural communication and fostering community development in the Upper West Region of Ghana.
